### 2. PURPOSE OF REPORT

2.1 To provide elected members with an update on current enforcement action. This report will focus on updating members with the details relating to the current number of open planning enforcement files, the different stages of any enforcement action paying particular attention to any details relating to enforcement notices issued, appeals and details of any court hearings pending for the first quarter of this year.

#### 3. CORPORATE PRIORITIES

- 3.1 The matters discussed in this report impact directly on the following corporate priorities:
  - A clean and green Rossendale creating a better environment for all.
  - A healthy and successful Rossendale supporting vibrant communities and a strong economy.
  - Responsive and value for money local services responding to and meeting the different needs of customers and improving the cost effectiveness of services.

#### 4. RISK ASSESSMENT IMPLICATIONS

- 4.1 All the issues raised and the recommendation(s) in this report involve risk considerations as set out below:
  - The Council has a statutory duty to enforce planning contraventions. Failure to regulate in this area will likely result in lack of confidence in the Development Control Service.

#### 5. BACKGROUND AND OPTIONS

- 5.1 Following a restructure of the Licensing and Planning Enforcement Unit, the Unit was redesignated the Public Protection Unit (PPU) with effect from 1<sup>st</sup> January 2011. The Public Protection Manager has responsibility for planning enforcement and Licensing including Licensing enforcement and from 1<sup>st</sup> July 2011, benefit fraud.
- 5.2 The Cabinet has agreed the Council's planning enforcement policy which sets out a framework within which the Council will take action. This policy is currently being reviewed.

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- 5.3 Legal Services have devised an enforcement instructions pack which Public Protection Officers use. This enables enforcement notices to be issued and served in a timely manner.
- 5.4 The details in this report cover the period 1<sup>st</sup> April 2011 to 30<sup>th</sup> June 2011.
- 5.5 It is intended to produce a report at the end of each quarter
- Members are to note that there are a number of open complaints about potential breaches of Planning Regulations from previous months and years relating to contraventions of planning control. The numbers of ongoing complaints at 30<sup>th</sup> June 2011 is 160. The figures for the previous periods are
  - Quarter 1 of 2010/2011 134 open investigations
  - Quarter 2 of 2010/2011 161 open investigations
  - Quarter 3 of 2010/2011 144 open investigations
  - Quarter 4 of 2010/2011 138 open investigations
- 5.7 During quarter 1 this year, 47 complaints have been received and 43 complaints have been closed.
- 5.8 Members are further advised that there are a number of enforcement notices currently in force from previous months
- During this period, 1 enforcement notice was issued and 1 was withdrawn due to queries from the Planning Inspectorate with regards to the wording of the notice. A new enforcement notice is to be served in the near future. The details of the ongoing notices can be found at Appendix A.
- 5.10 No appeal decisions have been received during Quarter 1 of 2011-12 from the Planning Inspectorate.
