Team Lancashire Indicators

Team Lancashire is the sub regional improvement and efficiency partnership comprising the 15 principal councils serving Lancashire's 1.5m people. The Partnership is founded on a common vision set out in the concordat "Working Better Together" signed up to by all 15 council leaders. At the heart of "Working Better Together" is the shared understanding that to deliver solutions to many of the problems facing Lancashire requires the efforts of more than just one player, and that our communities both want and deserve public services which are:

- High quality
- Accessible
- · Cost effective, and
- Joined up

Outcomes

- ✓ There will be no identifiable pockets of underperformance amongst Lancashire's councils
- ✓ There will be no councils at below level 3 of the Equality Standard for Local Government
- ✓ No council will score less than 3 for Use of Resources
- ✓ Measures of how satisfied people are with a range of issues will have improved, specifically:
 - Satisfaction with their neighbourhood as a place where people from different backgrounds get on well together,
 - Satisfaction with their neighbourhood as a place to, and
- ✓ Satisfaction with their ability to influence decisions in their locality
- ✓ All councils will have achieved the North West Charter for Member Development, with at least 50% achieving level 2
- ✓ Peer assessment will identify that collaborative working between Lancashire's councils is an example of good practice
- ✓ The Lancashire councils will have achieved the CSR07 efficiency target
- ✓ All Lancashire councils will have signed up to the Skills Pledge, with at least 50% achieving level 2
- ✓ Workforce Development activities within the programme will have had a beneficial impact on skills and employment measures for young people contained in the three LAA's
- ✓ Identifiable annual efficiencies in excess of the initial investment required will be delivered through the creation of shared services
- ✓ The creation of a procurement hub will generate efficiencies of at least an agreed multiple of the investment in the cost of the hub

Pennine Lancashire Multi-Area Agreement (MAA Indicators)

Mulit-Area Agreements (MAAs) were introduced as part of the 2006 White Paper: Strong and Prosperous Communities. They are voluntary agreements between central government and a group of councils, focused on a specific set of outcomes and targets. In Pennine Lancashire these Councils comprise Rossendale, Blackburn with Darwen, Burnley, Hyndburn, Pendle, Ribble Valley, together covering an area that has been identified as a distinct economic footprint, and Lancashire County Council. A multi area agreement is designed to be a cross-boundary local area agreement (LAA). They bring together key players in flexible ways to tackle issues that are best addressed in partnership – at a regional and sub-regional level.

The MAA identifies four priority areas:

- Transport Planning
- Skills and Worklessness
- Housing Spatial Planning
