## 6. ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

# Changes to the Regulation of Investigatory Powers Act

From 1st November 2012, local authorities may not authorise directed surveillance unless it is for the purpose of preventing or detecting a serious criminal offence (i.e. one which is punishable by a maximum term of at least 6 months of imprisonment) or offences relating to the sale of alcohol and tobacco to underage children.

## Update on Prosecution following Evidence obtained under RIPA

Members are asked to note a recent prosecution brought by the Council using evidence obtained under a RIPA authorisation last year.

Council officers "test purchased" a birthday party at a petting farm where they were able to obtain evidence that there were insufficient handwashing facilities and an inability to control the spread of animal faeces resulting in a failure to control the risk of e-coli. Donkey rides were also being offered without the required licence.

A petting farm in Bacup pleaded guilty to four charges relating to a failure to manage e-coli under the Health and Safety at Work etc. Act 1974 and one offence of operating a riding establishment without a licence under the Riding Establishments Act 1964. Due to seriousness of the offences, the owner was sentenced to five months imprisonment suspended for 2 years and 240 hours community service.

It was necessary to use RIPA in this case because it was the only way that officers could experience the way the attraction was operated when open to members of the public and what facilities were on offer. Given the seriousness of offences, it was also considered proportionate to use RIPA in this case.
