	General cross cutting factors to take into account are: Transport/travel issues to alternative locations might also be a consideration. Possible effect on how busy other facilities would become and customer satisfaction.
Appendix 4 details of Schools using Haslingden Pool (Provided by RLT)	12 primary schools use HSP for weekly school swimming sessions, for which 13 separate swim sessions are run weekly. 2 of these schools are Rossendale Special Needs schools and 2 of the schools are Special Needs schools from outside of the Borough. In addition, 6 secondary schools use the pool on an ad hoc basis (2 of which are special needs schools within the borough).
	If a decision was made to close HSP, the Council and RLT would work with the schools affected to identify alternative arrangements as far is as reasonably possible to accommodate them at alternative locations.
Appendix 5 comparison of services available at each swimming pool facility within Rossendale (Provided by RLT)	If a decision was taken to close Haslingden Swimming Pool, this information would be utilised to raise awareness and signpost customers to services at alterative facilities/services within Rossendale. In addition, actions to support the current user groups to be accommodated at alternative venues or find alternative sessions would be undertaken.

Bus route data:- Data is not available to determine what proportion of current HSP users use public transport in order to determine a specific impact. However it is recognised that any decision to close HSP might impact on public transport users.
	Initial bus route data indicates that additional bus journeys might be required should the option to either build an alternative pool or to close Haslingden Swimming Pool is pursued.

	Specific bus route journey details will be completed and made available as the consultation continues. The survey on location of pool users:- While the majority of Haslingden pool users live in Haslingden, data usage suggests that there is some cross over between Marl Pits and Haslingden Pool sites i.e. customers for who Haslingden is most local, may use Marl Pits and vice versa. Based on this information, should Haslingden pool close it is likely that some customers may start to use Marl Pits. This suggests that Marl Pits is a viable alternative for some users to be relocated / accommodated at, as some people already use both facilities or live in Haslingden but use Marl

Haslingden has the of the highest BME populations within the Borough.
