## 2. FINDINGS / EVIDENCE

What does this tell us? / What does it say?			
vidence used is set out in the Evidence Appendices – nlighted here as follows:			
A 25 by 8 yard 4 lane swimming pool built in 1936.  Currently used by disabled users, however there are restrictions; specifically there is no accessible toilet or changing facilities nor adequate access to the spectator area. Any further accessibility works is not currently economically viable.  There is assigned disabled parking.			
Tables 1&2 show a steady decline in usage figures year on year since 2007/08 for Haslingden Swimming Pool.  Table 3 shows that general swimming aside, the top 3 highest head count on a weekly basis is: Children's Lessons – 416 PW Primary Schools – 300 PW Swimming Club – 220 PW			
It is likely that the majority of the current user groups for specific swim sessions could be accommodated at other facilities/locations.  In particular there are 4 disabled users week who currently access one to one swimming sessions as HSP for whom would be impacted, but consultation to accommodate these users is currently is being explored.  There are two special needs schools on a weekly from outside of the Borough would also use the pool on a weekly basis and two special needs schools within the borough that use the pool on an had hoc basis. Alternatives will be explored during consultation.  Where other protected equality groups identified as a possible impact appropriate mitigating actions are being considered to accommodate them at alternative locations to reduce the impact. 	General cross cutting factors to take into account are:  Transport/travel issues to alternative locations might also be a consideration.  Possible affect on how busy other facilities would become and customer satisfaction.
Appendix 4 details of Schools using Haslingden Pool (Provided by RLT)	12 primary schools use HSP for weekly school swimming sessions, for which 13 separate swim sessions are run weekly. 2 of these schools are Rossendale Special Needs schools and 2 of the schools are Special Needs schools from outside of the Borough. In addition, 6 secondary schools use the pool on an ad hoc basis (2 of which are special needs schools within the borough).
	If a decision was made to close HSP, the Council and RLT would work with the schools affected to identify alternative arrangements as far is as reasonably possible to accommodate them at alternative locations.
Appendix 5 comparison of services available at each swimming pool facility within Rossendale (Provided by RLT)	If a decision was taken to close Haslingden Swimming Pool, this information would be utilised to raise awareness and signpost customers to services at alterative facilities/services within Rossendale. In addition, actions to support the current user groups to be accommodated at alternative venues or find alternative sessions would be undertaken.
